That's how Dr Leslie Kuek sees each of his patients. He relishes the challenge of finding the best solution for each of their problems

"The training to be a plastic surgeon is vigorous," insists Dr Leslie Kuek. But within that vigour is space for creativity. "For a nose that needs reconstruction, I can opt to use the patient's tissue, cartilage, ribs, artificial material, or implants," he describes. "The choices are

tremendous if you have the skills to do it." Dr Kuek obtained his advanced surgery degrees from the Royal Colleges of Edinburgh and Glasgow, winning the Young Surgeon's Award along the way. He honed his skill in plastic surgery in University of Tokyo and Taipei Chang Gung Hospital, then worked in SGH's Department of Plastic Surgery & Cosmetic Surgery, where he was instrumental in starting breast and facial paralysis reconstruction. He then started his own practice. "I've been in this business for 25 years, so I get brickbats and bouquets. Which of us has not stepped on other people's toes, intentionally or unintentionally?" Yet, he says he has a very good reputation. "But you have to do your own research."

Dr Kuek is excited about the potential of stem cell technology. "We would be able to create skin, muscle, bone and cartilage. If we can regenerate these cells, you can delay or even reverse aging." Any doctor who tells you he has never had any complaints is either lying through his teeth or hasn't worked enough!
